- Key stakeholders
- GPs and GP practices
- Consumers



Background - Shingles

- Latent varicella-zoster virus painful rash - "stabbing, chronic prickling, tingling, burning"
- · More common in older adults
- Associated with post-herpetic neuralgia
- 1 Nov 2016, Zostavax® was funded for people aged 70 years with catch-up from 71 to 79 years





Evaluation: National Shingles Vaccination Program



- As part of this evaluation, Computer Assisted Telephone Interviews (CATI) of consumers aged 70 to 79 years
- Aim: To assess knowledge, attitudes and behaviours of consumers
- Timing of CATI: September 2017



Methods - process evaluation among Australian consumers - September, 2017

- Computer Assisted Telephone Interviews (CATI) designed by NCIRS
- Random sample of 70-79 year olds Australia-wide (n=403)
- Random telephone dialling of home landlines
- Script read by interviewer and typed into the database
- Conducted by EKAS marketing research Sydney





Results - Consumer awareness ('Yes' answers)



Shingles vaccination and intention to vaccinate





Do you intend to receive the shingles vaccine in the near future? If yes, why?



If required or told to do so by my GP

The GP mentioned it but he didn't have any supplies and I haven't been back since

If the doctor recommends it, I wouldn't say no

Only if the doctor strongly recommends it

Consumer knowledge of shingles and the shingles vaccine

Shingles causes a painful rash - 90%

Shingles is caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox - 82%

The shingles vaccine is safe for most people - 81%

The vaccine is free for people aged 70 years old - 74%

People aged 71 – 79 years can get the vaccine for free – 73%

A person only needs one dose of the shingles vaccine –

Consumer beliefs and attitudes about shingles and the shingles vaccine

I am at risk of getting shingles True 31% False 53% Don't know 16%

I have concerns about the side effects of this vaccine Yes 7% No- 61% Don't know 11%

I find it difficult to go to the doctors for vaccination True 3% False 96% Don't know 1%



Major questions from consumers to their GP



- What are the side effects? (293)
- Efficacy. Does the vaccine really work? Does it prevent shingles? (186)
- Is the vaccine safe? (123)
- Will I need a booster dose? What sort of protection does it offer? (119)
- Do you recommend it for me? Do you think I should have it? What are the pros and cons for me? (108)
- Do I need the vaccine if I've already had shingles? (88)
- What is the cost? (83)

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Minor questions from consumers to their GP



- Why is it limited by age group? (37)
- Do I need the vaccine if I've already had chickenpox?
 (32)
- Will I be contagious for shingles or chickenpox after I have the vaccine? Will I give my grandchildren chickenpox? Will it give me chickenpox? (25)
- · Am I eligible for the new shingles vaccine? (21)
- Will it hurt? (10)
- Do I need it if I've never had chickenpox? (9)
- Can I have it with my next flu or pneumococcal vaccine? (7)
- Does it prevent chickenpox? (6)
- Can I get it on a private script? (5)

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Summary



Consumer awareness was high – 96% had heard of shingles or knew someone with shingles

 $\approx 75\%$ had received the vaccine, the remainder were waiting to see their doctor about it or waiting to turn 70. None said they were not going to get it.

Consumer knowledge was good – most consumers knew about shingles; knew someone who had had shingles, that it is a harmful disease; causes a painful rash

A few consumers were uncertain about their

- Risk
- Harmfulness of shingles
- · Association with chickenpox
- · Vaccine safety, efficacy, side effects and contraindications

Conclusions



Most consumers clearly want the new, free shingles vaccine, particularly if it is recommended by their doctor

Some consumers want the vaccine to be more widely available to younger and older age groups

Consumer education is required relating to questions and concerns that consumers have about the vaccine side effects and efficacy

GPs are the major source of information
